Section 2 – Report

2.1 Brief History

- 2.1.1. There is a premises licence in force at 'Jameson's Bar", a public house trading at 34 South Parade, Mollison Way, Edgware, Middlesex, HA8 5QL. A copy of the premises licence is attached to this report providing details of the licensable activities authorised, the opening times and the conditions attached to the licence.
- 2.1.2 On 31 August 2013, enforcement notices under the Environmental Protection Act 1990 were served on the occupier and the owner due to Officers from the Environmental Health Department witnessing a Statutory Nuisance on 31 August 2013.
- 2.1.3 The current licensable activities and hours under the premises licence are:

Live music (e), Recorded music (f), performance of dances (g), Performance similar to (e), (f), (g), Provision of facilities of music (i), Provision of facilities dance (j), Provision of facilities similar to (i), (j)

Monday – Thursday

10:00 - 00:00

Friday - Saturday	10:00 – 01:00 (the following morning)
Sunday	12:00 – 00:30 (the following morning)

Late night refreshment

Monday – Thursday	23:00 - 00:00
Friday – Saturday	23:00 – 01:00 (the following morning)

With respect to the hours open to the public, there are no times listed on the licence as this was originally a 'grandfather rights' conversion application.

- 2.1.4 On 11 September 2013 a review application was submitted by the Environmental Health Department at Harrow Council, as the relevant Environmental Health Authority. This review application relates to one of the licensing objectives - the prevention of public nuisance
- 2.1.5 The premises is situated on South Parade, Mollison Way which comprises of a parade of commercial premises with residential properties above the businesses. A location map is attached to this report.

2.2 <u>Representations</u>

The Environmental Health Authority has submitted an application to review the premises licence. A copy of this application is attached to this report. A further responsible authority, namely the Licensing Authority, has submitted a representation supporting the application for review and a copy of this representation is also attached to this report.

2.3 <u>Consultation</u>

The review application was advertised at the council offices and on the premises in accordance with the requirements under the Licensing Act 2003.

2.4 Licensing Guidance Implications

The Home Office has issued Guidance pursuant to section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 and paragraphs 11.1 – 11.30 of the Guidance covers reviews of (premises) licences.

2.5 Legal Implications

- 2.5.1 The Licensing Panel is required to hold a hearing to consider the review application and any relevant representations. The hearing must be held in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.
- 2.5.2 Having considered the application and all relevant representations from all parties, the Panel has to determine the application for the review of the premises licence. The Panel is required to take such of the steps listed below at 2.5.3 (if any), as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.
- 2.5.3 Where it considers it appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives to take a step(s), the options available to the Panel are:
 - 1. To modify the conditions of the Licence;
 - 2. To exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence;
 - 3. To remove the designated premises supervisor;
 - 4. To suspend the licence for a period not exceeding 3 months;
 - 5. To revoke the licence.

and for this purpose the conditions of the licence are modified if any of them is altered or omitted or any new condition added.

- 2.5.4 If the panel takes a step mentioned in 1 or 2 of paragraph 2.5.3 above, it may provide that the modification or exclusion is to have effect for only such period (not exceeding three months) as it may specify.
- 2.5.5 Any modified conditions should be practical and enforceable.
- 2.5.6 The licensing authority may at any time reject any ground for review specified in an application for review if it is satisfied that either: (a) the ground is not relevant to one or more of the four licensing objectives; or (b) the application is made other than by a responsible authority and the ground is frivolous, vexatious, or a repetition.
- 2.5.7 If any grounds of review are rejected on the basis set out in 2.5.6, the application for review is taken to be rejected to that extent.
- 2.5.8 In addition to determining the application in accordance with the legislation, Members must have regard to
 - The common law rules of natural justice.
 - The provisions of the Human Rights Act 1998.

- The considerations in section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998.
- 2.5.9 By section 6 of the Human Rights Act 1998, the Panel is required to act in a way that is compatible with rights under the European Convention for the Protection of Human Rights. The following provisions of the European Convention seem relevant: Article 6 (right to a fair trial) Article 14 (prohibition of discrimination) and Article 1 of the First Protocol (protection of property).
- 2.5.10 In relation to section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998, this states:

'without prejudice to any other obligation imposed on it, it shall be the duty of each authority to which this section applies to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those functions on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can to prevent, crime and disorder in its area.'

2.6 <u>Community safety</u>

Refer to the Licensing objectives, and Section 17 Crime and Disorder Act 1998 as noted above. The Borough Commander on behalf of the Metropolitan Police has not submitted a representation.



Please state the ground(s) for review (please read guidance note 1) On the 17th August 2013 I was on shift for the Councils Out Of Hours Noise service when a complaint of loud music emanating from Jameson's was received at 00.21. Prior to going to the premises we checked the Councils database to find that the premises was only licensed to sell alcohol until 01.00 hours and that members of the public were not allowed to enter or re-enter the premises after 11.00 hours. My colleague and I drove to the premises and noted that from the front the pub appeared to be closed. We contacted the complainant who advised us that the pub was still open and that she could hear the music within her property. The complainant advised us to approach the property from the rear service road. We walked down the rear service road and could hear loud music and people talking loudly emanating from the licensed premises as there were many patrons at the back of the licensed premises going in and out to smoke cigarettes. The music was loud and clearly audible form the premises to the rear therefore we decided to speak to the license holder. We went in to the premises at 01.00 hours and approached a female member of bar staff who was still serving alcohol at the time of our visit we identified ourselves and asked to speak to the person in charge, the designated premises supervisor. The lady said that she was in charge and the DPS therefore we requested if we could go out the back where it was quieter to talk. At that point I asked my colleague Maher Khan to caution the lady as it appeared that the premises was in breach of its licensing conditions. I asked the lady what her name was she identified herself as Miss Eva Okun the bar manager and licensee. I advised Miss Okun that it was past the licensing hours for the sale of alcohol to which she replied she was just about to close down for the evening. I advised Miss Okun that the music was far too loud and that it needed to be switched off. I also requested to see a copy of the premises license to which Miss Okun said 'oh what my personal license?' to which both my colleague and I responded no and said the premises license. Miss Okun returned with the premises license with a male standing amongst us who I assumed at the

time was a patron as appeared to be under the influence of alcohol as I could smell it off his breath and he appeared to be unsteady on his feet. Mrs Khan pointed out to Miss Okun that the DPS and the licensee was a Mr James Francis Kelly and not her as she had previously indicated to us. At that point Miss Okun pointed to the male who was stood with us and advised us that he was the licensee Mr James Francis Kelly. I asked the gentleman who was in charge and he said that he was. At that point I said to him that I felt he was under the influence of alcohol as he was unsteady on his feet and I could smell alcohol off his breath. He asked me if I was going to breathalise him to which I replied 'no I am not a police officer'. I advised both Miss Okun and Mr Kelly that they were in breach of several licensing conditions and that they would be contacted by the licensing department in the week. Miss Okun became argumentative and said 'I know many other premises that are open late into the night serving alcohol but nothing is done about them' to which I replied ' If you report them to us we will investigate them' to which she replied 'I'm not a grass'. At that point Mrs Khan and I decided to leave as Mr Kelly and Miss Okun were becoming incredibly argumentative.

On the 31st August 2013 I again was working on the Councils Out of Hours Noise Service with Mrs Maher Khan when a complaint regarding Jamesons public house was received at 22.57 hours. The complainant advised that they were again being disturbed by loud music from the premises and that they were finding it difficult to rest and relax in their home. At11.08 hours we were inside the complainants bedroom and could clearly hear loud music from the licensed premises. The music was in the form of a live band which appeared to go up and down in volume. The complainant advised us that it was louder before we arrived and had started at approximately 22.00 hours. The complainant and her husband advised us that the playing of loud music and bands at the premises is a regular occurrence mostly on the weekends. They advised us that the music usually goes on until 02.00- 03.00 hours and in an extreme case 08.00 hours the next morning. The complainant advised us that they had once called down to the pub to ask them to turn the music down but they did not. We were in the complainants property for approximately 10 – 15 minutes. Both my colleague and I were satisfied that a statutory nuisance was emanating from the premises and decided that we would serve legal Notices under the Environmental Protection Act 1990 section 80.

We called in for police assistance (CAD Number 11208) as we were going to serve legal Notices. Two officers assisted us in the service of legal Notices under the aforementioned legislation, QA560 & QA558. Whilst sitting in the car drawing up the Notices and waiting for police assistance we noted a number of persons entering and re-entering the licensed premises past the 23.00 hour licensing condition for no entry or re-entry to patrons. We entered the premises and saw Miss Okun, I asked her where the licensee Mr Kelly was she said he was not on site but only ten minutes away. I asked her if we could go out the back where it was quiet so that we could talk. I advised Miss Okun that I was serving two legal Notices CSS/SDMNK/01 &

CSS/SDMNK/02 (Exhibit One & Two) under the aforementioned legislation. I explained that the music needed to be switched off with immediate effect (22.45 hours) at the premises as it was causing a statutory nuisance. Miss Okun asked if the band could finish the set to which I said no this was a legal Notice and breach of the Notice would be an offence. Miss Okun was a bit argumentative however the police

officer spoke with her and explained that she needed to comply with the Notice straight away. Miss Okun went into the premises and told the band to cease playing. I then requested to speak to Miss Okun again once the music was off to advise her to ask her clientele to keep their voices down as they were being very loud and causing a nuisance. Miss Okun was very upset and I advised her that the music was not to go back on and that they were to comply with the Notices. If a breach of the Notice was to be witnessed further action would be taken. Miss Okun wanted to know who had complained to which I advised her that I was not at liberty to divulge that information.

Miss Okun angrily assured me that the music would not go back on.

During that evening I noted that there were no door supervisors present on site. The licensee was also not on site. As stated before patrons were seen entering and reentering the premises after 23.00hours. These are all breaches that I witnessed on the evening of the 31st August 2013. I also noticed that there were no door supervisors and patrons entering and re-entering the premises on the evening of the 17th August 2013.

I have since been advised that the Councils licensing officer and police licensing officer visited the premises on the 2nd September 2013 as a result of our enforcement actions over the weekend. From my discussions with the officers I believe the premises is in breach of at least 12 out of 18 of its premises license conditions of which I witnessed 4 on the nights of the 17th and 31st August 2013.

I understand that Mr James Francis Kelly has been the licensee since 2005. The London Borough of Harrow has received 20 complaints since 2006, of which 6 complaints have been received since the 24th June 2013 regarding loud noise nuisance emanating from Jameson's Public House.

I therefore am applying for a review of the license on the grounds that a statutory nuisance is emanating from the premises and the licensee and management staff do not have any regard of the licensing conditions imposed on them. I am therefore requesting that their licensing hours of operation for the sale of alcohol be reduced to 00.00 with drinking up time until 00.30. The premise does not currently have a closure time therefore I request that a closure time of 00.30 be implemented.

Further to reports from the Out of Hours Noise Service as to noise nuisance from music and other alleged breaches of the Premises Licence, I visited the premises on 2nd September 2013 around 1255 with Police Licensing Officer Jas Verdi.

As we entered the there were about 10 to 12 persons in the premises and about 4 of them were sitting around the bar area with a very young boy, about 11 years old, with them. The bar was attended by Gabriella Surdu.

Met with Eva Okun, who introduced herself as the manager at the premises for the last 5 years. Ms Okun also confirmed that Mr Kelly, the DPS and Licence holder had just left the premises and will be returning later. Ms Okun tried to call Mr Kelly to return but unfortunately he had another appointment.

I explained to her the reasons for our visit and asked her whether the premises are fitted with a noise limiting device as per condition 17 of the Premises Licence. Ms Okun confirmed that there was never such a device in operation.

As the Noise team has reported that there were no door supervisors present at the time of their visit, I asked about whether there were any door supervisors employed at the premises. Ms Okun could not provide any details of the names or their ID numbers at that time. Ms Okun further confirmed that there was no female door staff employed at the premises.

The same afternoon, I received a call from Mr Kelly, the Licensee and DPS at the premises who confirmed that the Manager Ms Okun is the female door supervisor. I asked Mr Kelly to provide the SIA details for Ms Okun, and Mr Kelly is yet to reply to that request. Under the conditions of the Premises Licence it is an offence to employ door supervisors who are not registered with the SIA.

This premises Licence was issued under the Transitional provisions and due to those provisions this licence has no "Hours Open to Public" stipulated. This appears to have led to the problem of the premises remain open to customers well after the licensable activities causing a public nuisance.

It is also important to note that further to the deregulation of Regulated entertainments, any conditions relating to regulated entertainment are only applicable after 11pm. However, further to this premises causing a public nuisance and not complying with the licence conditions, it is the Authority's request that the following should be considered by the Panel.

- 1. to provide a terminal hour 30 minutes after all licensable activities.
- 2. to impose a condition to state that deregulation does not apply to these premises and all conditions relating to regulated entertainment will apply at all times regulated entertainments are provided.

Amplified music and vocals were clearly audible from complainant's bedroom. 12 Mrs Dunning and I were satisfied that it was a Statutory Nuisance and decided to serve Sec.80 Notice for Abatement of nuisance to Jameson's Bar. The pub was full of patrons 13 14 and due to our previous experience two weeks ago when we visited Jameson's Bar for the same sort of complaint and their response to our informal approach we decided to 15 16 get police assistance this time. Mrs Dunning and I visited Jameson's Bar with Police Officers QA560 and QA558 at 23.40hrs. Band was playing and patrons were dancing. 17 People were coming in and out of the premises. 19 the entrance of the premises. Mrs Dunning asked for the person in charge and a female 20 bartender came forward and said her name was Eva Okun and she was in charge of the premises. I recognised the lady from my previous visit to Jameson's Bar on 17th August 21 22 2013 for the noise nuisance issue. Mrs Dunning told her that the music was very loud 23 and was audible from the neighbouring residents' premises. We are satisfied that it is 24 Statutory Nuisance and I am serving you with Notice for Abatement of Nuisance under 25 Section 80 of the Environmental Protection Act 1990. You need to stop the music now. 26 Mrs Dunning served the Notice at 23.45hrs to abate the nuisance forthwith. Eva Okun 27 said to Mrs Dunning that they will stop the music after the song that was playing. Mrs 28 Dunning said to her that she is required to stop the music forthwith and the nuisance 29 must not reoccur. Police officer QA560 asked Eva Okun where the Designated 30 Premises Supervisor (DPS) was and she said that he has gone out for a while. Police 31 Officer said to her that it is an offence to sell alcohol in the absence of a DPS and it will 32 be reported to the Licensing Police. Music was stopped and we left the premises at 33 23:58hrs.

20 We called in for police assistance (CAD Number 11208) as we were aware that there 21 were likely to be a number of patrons within the premises. Two officers assisted us in 22 the service of legal Notices under the aforementioned legislation, QA560 & QA558. 23 Whilst sitting in the car drawing up the Notices and waiting for police assistance we 24 noted a number of persons entering and re-entering the licensed premises past the 25 23.00 hour licensing condition for no entry or re-entry to patrons. We entered the 26 premises and saw Miss Okun, I asked her where the licensee Mr Kelly was she said he was not on site but only ten minutes away. I asked her if we could go out the back 27 28 where it was guiet so that we could talk. I advised Miss Okun that I was serving two 29 legal Notices CSS/SDMNK/01 & CSS/SDMNK/02 (Exhibit One & Two) under the 30 aforementioned legislation. I explained that the music needed to be switched off with 31 immediate effect (23.45 hours) at the premises as it was causing a statutory nuisance. 32 Miss Okun asked if the band could finish the set to which I said no this was a legal 33 Notice and breach of the Notice would be an offence. Miss Okun was a bit argumentative however the police officer spoke with her and explained that she needed 34 35 to comply with the Notice straight away. Miss Okun went into the premises and told the 36 band to cease playing. I then requested to speak to Miss Okun again once the music was off to advise her to ask her clientele to keep their voices down as they were being 37 very loud and causing a nuisance. Miss Okun was very upset.
