

This policy gives local people more control over what happens in their local area and involves them in shaping decisions for their local area. It promotes local decision-making and as such encourages empowerment.

The council aims to provide a clear, consistent service for users. At the same time, it aims to protect the safety of highway users, to prevent nuisance and to regulate the location and number of street traders.
