Question: "The planning applications for the Hive Stadium published in the

Harrow Times recently do not take into consideration the effect on local residents including Merlin Crescent where cars park on

Match Days including the recent game.

The objections are as follows:

- 1. The increase in gates from 5,000 to over 8,000. The last match was 2,000. Gate money now and in the future does not cover the Players and the running of the Hive. There is a larger deficit each week.
- 2. Alteration of the stands and building a new stand.
- 3. In the planning application there is a mention of the community. This was probably a sop for the planning application to be passed. As a resident and part of the community I have not been consulted on the plans.
- 4. The planning committee has members of Queensbury Ward and there is a conflict of interest.
- 5. Going from past experience, I fear that Harrow Council will pass these plans without proper consideration for residents.
- 6. Legal matters will be taken if the scheme is passed with a judicial review and legal matters in the High Court.

Question: "We have reached a stage when Brown Bins have become a

problem for our refuse staff who often seem to omit emptying those that have been paid for, resulting in residents who have paid for their Brown Bins needing to tell the depot (if they can get

through) that they have been missed.

Harrow Councillors should by now realise the refuse collection

that has been applied to residents in our Borough since April 2016 is far from being acceptable and seems likely to be part of the reason for so much fly-tipping and rats badly affecting parts of our Borough.

Surely a proper democratic debate at the next Council meeting to consider restoring the former charge-free refuse collection would stand a chance of satisfying Harrow residents and improving the situation in our entire Borough?"

Question:

"The residents of Woodlands, South Way, Thrush Green & Cambridge Road, majority households have objected to having speed cushions/humps. The residents welcome the 20mph zone. Why has the councillor Graham Henson ignored the views of majority of the residents? The data shows that speed cushions and humps increase pollution, there are digital VAS measures available, why is he bulldozing over the residents views? The time the data was collected, there was closure of a lane and temporary lights on Pinner road, therefore people were turning down Woodlands, assuming that Woodlands was a through road, only to reach the bottom and have to come back. Therefore the data collected is not a true representation of the minimal cars.

There have been no accidents in 20 years from the data provided by the council and local residents from 1964 recall no accidents going back further. How does he expect to improve on reduction on casualties when there have been no accidents? How can Graham Henson make decisions for residents in Woodlands, when he has never responded to request to meet the residents or come and view the road?"
