2017-18 Year End Financial Summary

The level of fraud and corruption identified for 2017-18 is £3,333,916.1 which represents an approximate return on investment for the team's costs of just over 13:1.

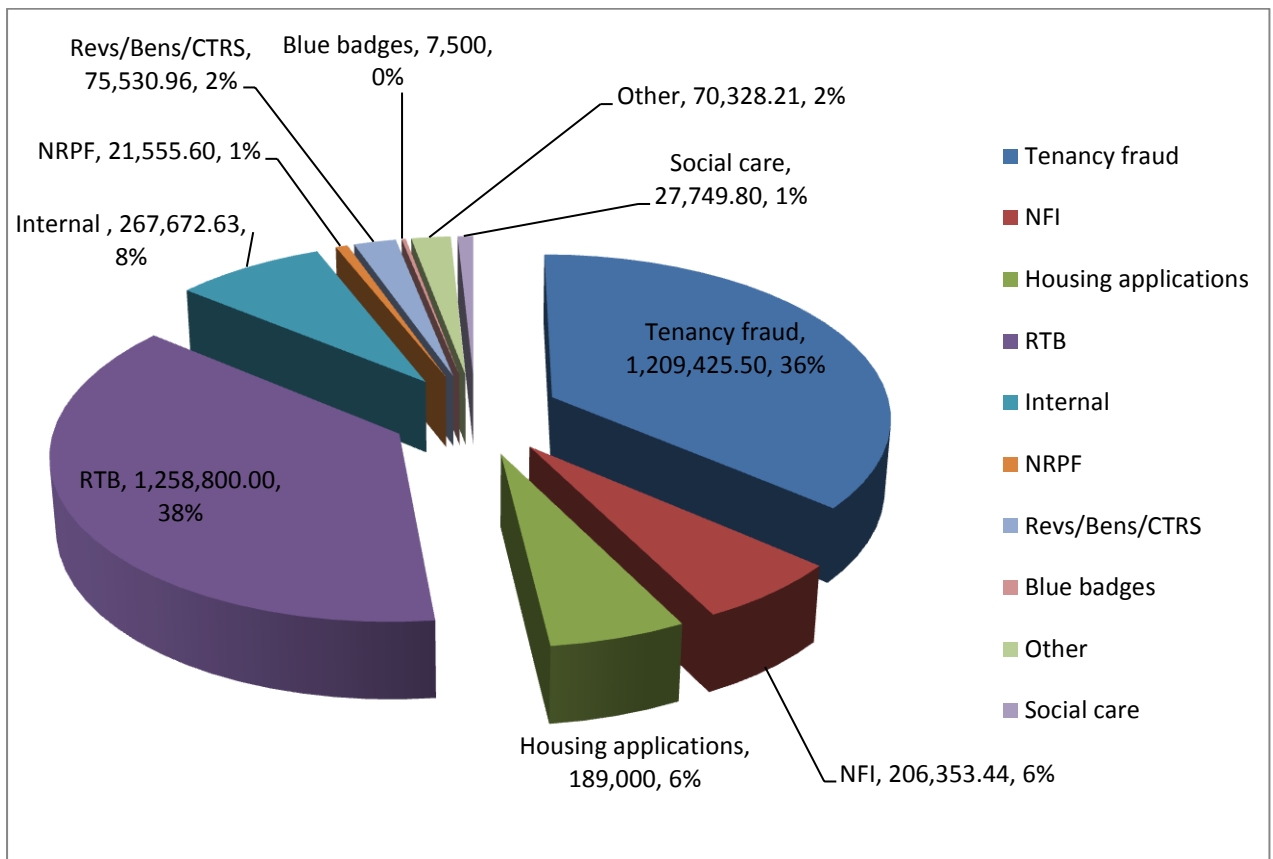


Fig 2 Fraud savings and overpayments comparison 2016/17 – 2017/18

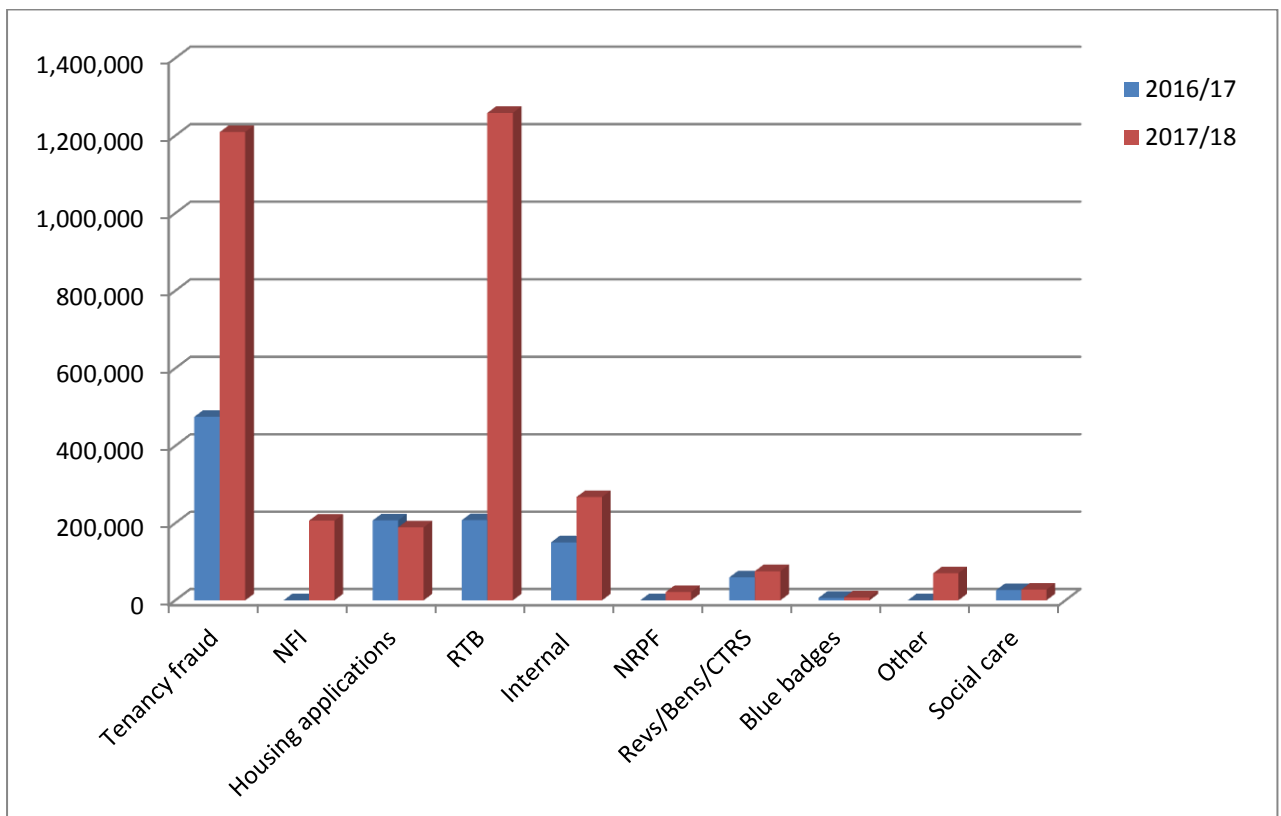


Fig 3 Fraud referrals breakdown 2017/18

It is, however important to note that 96% of the total fraud identified was preventative notional fraud savings compared to 4% actual losses. See fig 1, 2 & 3 for an illustration and breakdown of fraud types, values and referrals.

Fig 1 Fraud savings and overpayments 2017/18
