1. Summary of proposal, impact on groups with protected characteristics and mitigating actions (to be completed after you have completed sections 2 - 5)

a) What is your proposal?

The Council needs to retender the contract to deliver NHS Health Checks in Harrow. The NHS Health Checks programme is a cardiovascular check for adults aged 40-74 without a pre-existing condition and who have not had an NHS Health Check in the last five years. This is one of the statutory duties of a local authority. The current contract with Harrow Health CIC (the Harrow GP Federation) expires on 31 March 2019.

The intention is to award the contract to a single supplier e.g. a federation of GP practices.

There is a strong link between poverty and poor cardiovascular health. Some ethnicities are also at greater risk i.e. those from south east Asia.

These health checks should not be confused with the Learning Disability Annual Health Checks which are the responsibility of the NHS.

Age	Projected GLA figures show that in 2018 Harrow has around 99,580 residents between the ages of 40 to 74 years old, which is around 40% of all residents.				
	The NHS Health Check will be for all patients registered with a Harrow GP in this age group.				
	(It should be noted that a significant proportion of the residents aged 40-74 will have a pre-existing cardiovascular condition and, as such, would be excluded from the NHS Health Checks programme. In addition, the programme is based on patients registered with Harrow GP practices i.e. some will be patients resident in neighbouring local authorities. The programme is based on reciprocity and therefore Harrow residents registered with GP practices in neighbouring local authorities would be seen under the programme in those authorities.)				
Disability	Based on ONS data from 2017 approximately 3,600 individuals in Harrow are in receipt of disability benefit and aged 40-74.				
	The top 5 conditions being claimed for disability benefit in Harrow for the 40-74 age range are arthritis, psychosis, learning disability, disease of muscles, joints or bones and back pain. These account for 52% of all conditions.	\boxtimes			
	Arthritis is the top condition being claimed for at 17% by 40-74 year olds, followed by psychosis at 15%.				
	If a patient has a pre-existing cardiovascular condition they would be excluded from the				

	NHS Health Check programme as they and their GP would already be aware of their risks. Learning Disability patients would already be entitled to an annual health check but would not be excluded from this programme. There would be no negative impact on patients with disability, only a positive one.			
Gender reassignment	While there are no figures to hand, any patient who had undergone gender reassignment would be invited as any other patient for an NHS Health Check.			
Marriage and Civil Partnership	There would be a positive impact in as much as the NHS Health Check programme would also be open to carers. It is know that there is a 23 percent increased risk of stroke for spousal carers ¹ .	\boxtimes		
Pregnancy and Maternity	Approximately 25% of all births in Harrow were to mothers over 35 in 2016/17. There are no statistics to hand on the numbers of births to over 40 year olds. There would be no negative impact on mothers in this age bracket. They would also benefit from NHS Health Checks. In addition, the health of expectant or recent mothers would also be expected to be closely monitored by maternity / perinatal health services as a matter of course.			\boxtimes

Race/ Ethnicity	According to GLA figures approximately 35% of Harrow residents aged between 40-74 are South Asians i.e. of Indian, Pakistani or Bangladeshi ethnic origin. Under the NHS Health Checks programme it would be expected that there would be a positive impact on this protected characteristic given the higher prevalence for cardiovascular disease for those of South Asian ethnic origin. According to the British Heart Foundation, the rates of diabetes among South Asians are at least twice as high as in the general population. A further 21% are of Harrow residents aged between 40-74 are of other Asian, Arab or Black ethnic origin. It is known that these ethnicities also have a higher risk of cardiovascular disease. ²			
Religion or belief	According to the 2011 census figures the religion of 40-74 year olds was as follows: Christian 39% Buddhist 1% Hindu 25% Jewish 5% Muslim 9% Sikh 1% Other religion 3% No religion 10% Religion not stated 6% There would be a positive impact on religion or belief in as much as it is linked to race / ethnicity.
