### **Harrow Alcohol Strategy**

## **Executive Summary**

### **Background**

Reducing alcohol related harm and encouraging sensible drinking is a key national and local priority. At the request of the Safer Harrow Management Group a multi-agency alcohol strategy has been developed with input from the alcohol subgroup of the Drug and Alcohol Steering Group.

#### Content

The strategy sets out the key local and national drivers for action, local needs and current services. It identifies gaps in current services and makes prioritised recommendations for multi-agency action.

# **Key points**

- Alcohol misuse has a significant impact on individuals, families and communities. Its impact can be measured financially, in health terms and in terms of violence and crime and fear of crime. It also has a significant impact on that agencies that have a responsibility for the outcomes of alcohol misuse including health, local authorities, police and voluntary organisations
- Accurate data on alcohol consumption is scarce but figures from the General Household Survey 2004 suggest that in London 32% of men and 15% of women drank above sensible levels of drinking. These figures are less than England as a whole. The survey also demonstrated that people from most but not all ethnic groups were on average more likely to be non-drinkers and less likely to drink above sensible limits and binge drink than the general population
- Links between drinking and deprivation are complex and those people most likely to drink are those who are unemployed and those on high incomes
- Harrow and Wealdstone Town Centres are hotspots for alcohol related crime incidents
- In Harrow it is estimated that 30% of domestic violence is alcohol related
- Local audit suggests that 1 in 6 attendances at A&E are alcohol related
- There are a range of interventions lead mainly by the council and the police to reduce alcohol related crime through the anti-social behaviour unit. These include Anti-Social Behaviour Orders and the proposed Controlled Drinking Zone

- There are alcohol education programmes in the majority of harrow Schools as part of the healthy Schools Standard
- Trading Standards conduct under age test purchase operations on a regular basis
- Alcohol counselling and treatment services are provided through voluntary organisations and Central and North West London Mental Health Trust
- An alcohol diversion worker has recently joined the Harrow Drug Intervention Programme
- There are service gaps around sharing of information about services and referral pathways into counselling and treatment
- There is no accurate and joined up multi-agency information and there is no accurate information from A&E departments
- Much of the alcohol related work in Harrow addresses the consequence of alcohol rather than education and prevention
- The strategy makes a number of recommendations. These include:
  - To develop a multi-agency alcohol forum
  - To deliver increased education and prevention programmes in schools
  - To establish a Pub Watch Scheme
  - To increase training for pub and club door staff, A&E staff, primary care staff and others
  - To develop clear information on available services for professionals and service users and improve links between different services
  - To develop referral pathways for counselling and treatment
  - To develop a brief intervention service in Primary Care
  - To develop multi-agency data collection
