Section 2 – Report Background

On 21st April, the Overview and Scrutiny committee received a report outlining proposed projects for inclusion in the scrutiny work programme for 2009/10. This meeting authorised officers to begin discussions with the council's corporate strategy board and with cabinet in order ascertain their views on the proposed projects and also to identify any additional projects which they would like to suggest be included in the work programme. Comments received are incorporated in the matrix attached as Appendix One.

As this is the final year of the current administration and in order to maintain the political neutrality of scrutiny, councillors agreed in April, that the work programme must be completed by January 2010. Councillors are therefore asked to bear this in mind when identifying the projects they wish to include in the work programme. In order to ensure that projects are approached systematically and that the highest priorities are tackled first, councillors are also asked to prioritise those that they include in the work programme. If it is preferred, the scrutiny team can prepare an appropriate timetable for delivering the programme and discuss further with councillors.

Councillors may also wish to leave some room in the programme in order for urgent projects that emerge during the year to also be addressed. In addition, since the original list of projects was drawn up, a number of additional items have been flagged up and these are listed below for further consideration

- Impact of the re-opening Wealdstone High Street to traffic this was deferred from the work programme in 2008/09 in order to give the changes more time to bed in and thus their impact to be assessed.
- Issues arising from the development of the 'Use of Resources' and 'Area Assessment' improvement plans – there are no specific details on this at the moment but there may be a number of projects which will be appropriate for scrutiny investigation and which councillors may wish to include in the work programme as necessary

Financial Implications

All projects included in the scrutiny work programme will be delivered from within existing resources.
