Section 2 - Report

Since the last work programme report, the Overview and Scrutiny committee has undertaken the following projects:

- Standing review of the 'Better Deal for Residents' programme phase one
- Implications of the HAVS investigation challenge panel
- Review of the council's performance management processes phase one

This report updates the committee on progress on each of these projects.

All projects undertaken thus far have benefited from the inclusion of local people from the Scrutiny Pool of Advisors.

Standing review of the 'Better Deal for Residents' programme – phase one The Overview and Scrutiny committee established this project to monitor the performance of the council's ambitious transformation programme. The council is required to identify significant levels of savings over the next 3 years and will only achieve these savings through radical transformation of services and a new relationship with residents. It is imperative that the programme is also considered by the scrutiny function in order to safeguard the best interests of local people.

The first phase of the review has focussed on the programme/project management process in place across the council through which the delivery of the programme is being monitored. Members of the group have met with project management professionals and also with the senior management of the organisation.

A report outlining the findings of this project is currently being drafted and will be presented to the Overview and Scrutiny committee in June.

Implications of the HAVS investigation

As reported previously, this project was designed to consider implications of the HAVS investigation for the future relationship between the council and voluntary sector. The project had three components:

- grants administration- in particular monitoring processes
- training for trustees
- future arrangements for sector-wide representation.

In order to support the panel's investigation, the Internal Audit service undertook a review of the grants administration process to identify risks and potential mitigation of these risks.

The review group has now met and an initial draft report is being prepared. It is likely to be presented to the Overview and Scrutiny committee in June.

Review of the council's performance management processes – phase one One of the initial actions of the new national government was a radical change to the public sector inspection and performance management regime. The Government announced the abolition of the national indicator set, Comprehensive Area Assessment and emphasised the importance of bottom up performance management with the creation of legions of 'armchair auditors'. This review has helped to shape the council's response to this change and the first phase considered how the council could reconstruct the indicator set operating locally. The report from this first phase was agreed by the Overview and Scrutiny committee in March and was considered by Cabinet in April.

Future Projects

Unlike previous years, the scrutiny work programme is now far more responsive to the changing local government environment. This means that, whilst an initial decision may have been taken by the committee to undertake a project, as circumstances have changed, councillors have chosen to defer, cancel or consider a project using different methodology, most usually by considering the issue at a committee meeting. This will continue to be the case as it is important for the committees' investigations to reflect the radically changing public sector landscape. The following projects have been dealt with in this way since the last report:

- Capital overspend to be considered at a future meeting of the Performance and Finance sub committee
- Housing Ambition Programme considered at the Performance and Finance sub committee in January

The projects below have been proposed for inclusion in the scrutiny work programme by the Scrutiny Leadership Group subject to the agreement of the Overview and Scrutiny committee

Standing review of the budget

Phase two of this project will investigate the impact of the Better Deal for Residents on the community, our partners and staff and will investigate how far the programme has delivered its intended outcomes. The project is a long-term, standing review and as such quarterly reports of progress will be made to the Overview and Scrutiny committee during the lifetime of the programme.

The second phase of the performance management review will consider what the council's future performance management framework could look like, how we make information available to local residents and the technological solutions which the council might like to use. A final report from this project is expected in September.

Snow Clearance

The project will consider how effectively the council has been able to respond to the increasingly extreme winter weather conditions and identify any possible improvements which might be adopted in future. This is likely to take the form\of a challenge panel which will be scheduled for June.

Engaging with young people

Membership of this project is still to be determined, members of the committee are invited to volunteer. The project will consider how effectively the council engages with younger residents.

In addition to these specific projects, the Leadership Group has proposed that the relevant committees consider the issues below in order to consider whether each merits more detailed consideration. If it is agreed that they should become specific projects then space will be identified in the work programme to accommodate them.

- Health and housing
