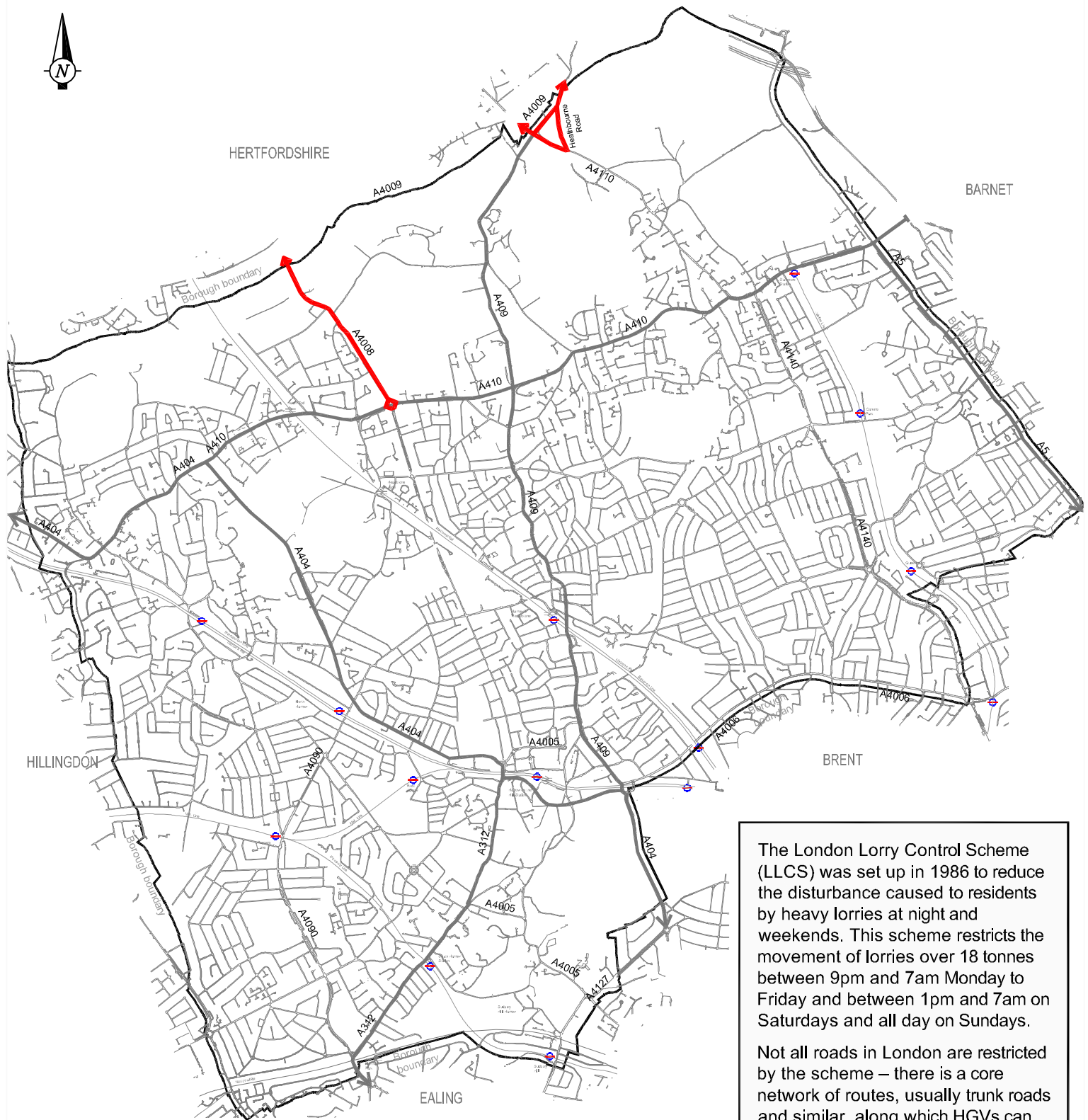


APPENDIX A

LONDON LORRY CONTROL SCHEME AND THE EXCLUDED ROUTE NETWORK

The London Lorry Control Scheme (LLCS) was set up in 1986 to reduce the disturbance caused to residents by heavy lorries at night and weekends. This scheme restricts the movement of lorries over 18 tonnes between 9pm and 7am Monday to Friday and between 1pm and 7am on Saturdays and all day on Sundays.

Not all roads in London are restricted by the scheme – there is a core network of routes, usually trunk roads and similar, along which HGVs can travel at any time without needing permission to do so. These roads are known as "excluded roads", and are collectively called the Excluded Route Network, or ERN and are shown on the plan.



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
