Dear Nick

I would like to bring to your attention the significant difficulties Harrow Council has in striving to maintain our high standards and comply with statutory requirements in the establishment of school places in light of the growth in pupil numbers in Harrow.

Harrow, like most London boroughs, is experiencing a significant increase in pupil numbers especially in the primary sector. All the forecasts are for the increase in pupil numbers to continue. Harrow, in consultation with the school community, has developed a Primary School Expansion Strategy that would hopefully ensure that we are able to provide a suitable school place for all Harrow children in the coming years. As part of this strategy we are currently embarking upon the permanent expansion of eleven schools which will cost a significant sum, particularly in the next two years.

We strongly feel that compared to our neighbouring boroughs the funding we have been allocated by the DfE is disproportionately low and this will inevitably impact on our ability to deliver the necessary school places. The DfE are providing capital grant for the growth in pupil numbers through the Basic Need Grant. In the Basic Need Grant, which is allocated annually, Harrow has fared badly in both the 2011/12 and 2012/13 allocations. Also in the recent funding announcement for the additional Basic Need Grant, Harrow was in the bottom four of all London boroughs and only received £120,000 compared to some of our neighbours who received over £20,000,000. This equates to Harrow receiving an equivalent of 4% relative to the 2011/12 allocation compared to the average receipt of outer London Boroughs of 157%. To put this in context, if you compare the total Basic Need Grants allocated for 2011/12 and 2012/13 to the actual growth in pupil numbers, as recorded on the school census, the funding per pupil growth in Harrow is by far the lowest of any outer London Borough at £8,776, compared to the outer London average of £31,615. Especially bemusing is the fact that authorities with significantly lower pupil increases for 2009 to 2011 are receiving significantly more funding than Harrow. Further details are provided in the attached annex for your consideration.

We have raised these significant concerns with the DfE with a clear explanation of why any spare capacity we may have spread across many schools does not alleviate the cost of required permanent expansions, but have yet to receive any indication that the issues will be addressed, and on the contrary feel that the latest allocation continues the disproportionately low allocations suffered by Harrow.
