We are a community group that supports the proposed building project at Vaughan Primary School, for a number of important reasons. We have collected 1125 signatures from supportive Harrow residents and employees.

The school intake has now permanently increased from 60 to 90 pupils a year. As it is, the current school building is not fit for purpose, and by September 2014 it will fail to accommodate this increase without temporary classrooms.


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

In line with the council's requirements, demographic data was requested from all clients.







Only 35% of respondents consider they have no disability, 6% preferred not to state. 59% of council tenants stated they have a disability. This is a high figure compared to the 19-20% prevelance of disability reported in the Annual Population Survey, but may reflect the higher

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
numbers of disabled people concerned about the effects of welfare reform and therefore more likely to take up the offer of a visit from the CAB.




Asian respondents were under-represented in the sample (compared to the proportion of the Asian population in the borough as a whole). White respondents were over-represented.




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







Given the lower number of respondents in the younger age groups the 2% pregnancy/maternity leave rate is not surprising.









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
