
Key challenges:

- During lockdown, usual methods of recruitment marketing were put on hold. The Harrow People Magazine was not published and no face to face events or information evenings could be held.
- To continue raising awareness of the need for new Foster Carers in Harrow during the pandemic, leaflets were distributed to households in the borough. A Virtual Information Session was held and fostering promoted via Harrow Website and Facebook Page.
 - The Department will be resuming the usual methods of active recruitment now that the Covid-19 restrictions have lifted by going into the community, holding events and targeting communities to raise the profile of fostering, particularly the Eastern European community.

Type of placements for Children Looked After












Fostering Recruitment Comparison




Fostering Year Comparison: 2019 - 2020 and 2020 - 2021

Private Fostering



- 10 new private fostering notifications (2020-2021).
- 6 of the notifications were assessed as not private fostering.
- 4 new private fostering arrangements started during the year. At the end of March 2021 there were 6 active private fostering arrangements.

Private fostering is the term used when **someone who is not a parent or a** 'close relative' (eg. great aunt, cousin, mum's friend or a neighbour) is looking after a child or young person under the age of 16 (under 18 if they are disabled) for 28 days or more in their own home.

Fostering Service Plans for 2021-2022



- West London Fostering Project focussing on Marketing and Recruitment and supporting Carers.
- Increase fostering recruitment to meet the profiles of our looked after children. Reach out to Eastern European communities to increase pool of Carers from this area.
- Panel Handbook will be updated and revised
 - Recruit a male white Fostering and Permanency Panel member within the Central List.
 - Continue to develop a Men's Carers support group.
 - Hold quarterly support groups for Connected Persons and SGO Carers and link in with the local Schools.
 - Continue with a programme of varied specialist training for all Carers, and further develop specialist training for Connected and SGO Carers.


Overview



- PEP returns remain at 100%.
- 111 pupils of Statutory School Age (SSA) on roll. This is a slight drop in cohort numbers by 3 students since last year.
- 70% of students have been in care for 1 year or longer
- 50% of pupils are educated outside of Harrow
- 95% of students attend schools which are Ofsted rated as 'Good' or better.
- 23% of students have an EHCP.

The Population of Harrow Virtual School By Ethnicity: 2020-2021





- Our largest groups are White (55%), closely followed by Asian (25%).
- There is an increase of 7% in the number of children from Mixed Backgrounds.
- Intervention Programmes: English Proficiency Programmes, 1:1 tuition, EAL Summer Camp are in place to support our most vulnerable groups.

School Attendance 2020-21



Across The Year

- 80% (84/105) of pupils had an 'X' mark (the mark given when children cannot attend school due to a COVID related matter). The 'X' mark is an authorised absence.
- 78% of eligible children attended school
- 8% of students had a suspension
- No child had a permanent exclusion

Summer Term(2021)

- 45% (47/105) had an 'X' mark
- 87% of eligible children attended school
- 23% had 100% attendance




• Reception:

- 60% (3/5) of pupils achieved 'good level of development' in Early Years' Assessments. The England average 48%.
- Key Stage 1:
 - 67% (2/3) of pupils achieved 'expected standards' in Writing, Reading and Maths. The England average: 52%-Reading, 49% Maths and 42% for Writing
- Key Stage 2:
 - 67% (2/3) of pupils achieved 'greater depth' in Reading. The England average is 12%.
 - 67% (2/3)of pupils achieved 'expected standards' in Writing. The England average is 50%.
 - 33% (1/3) of pupils achieved 'expected standards' in Maths. The England average is 51%.

Key Stage 4 Provisional Results






In the academic year 2020-21 there were 7 students in Year 11 in care for 12 months or longer.

- 30% (2/7) have an Educational, Health and Care Plan EHCP, 30% (2/7) have English as an Additional Language (EAL) and 40% (3/7) are known to the Youth Offending Team (YOT).
- One student received 11 GCSEs grades 4-8
- Four students achieved GCSE passes (1-8) in both English and Maths.

- In July there were 20 students on roll.
- 75% (15/20) are in education, 25% (5/20) are NEET
- All students that are in education attend a FE College, Sixth Form or an alternative FE setting including apprenticeship providers.

- 2 students obtained 3 A level passes;

Destinations

Priorities



- Catch-up interventions to support children who have fallen behind with their learning.
- To increase the number of children with good school attendance from 90% to 95% or higher.
- To increase the Attainment 8 Score (18) to be in line with or above the England Average (21).
- To review education packages for 'hard to reach' Key Stage 3 and Key 4 students.
- Black and Asian boys have been identified as a vulnerable group and represent 57% of the cohort with a suspension. Further interventions to be explored for all pupils at risk of receiving a suspension.

New Processes

Initial health assessments are being triaged in response to the Covid pandemic. Assessments are completed either face to face, virtual or telephone on a case by case basis. Review health assessment are being offered face to face appointments. However, if declined they are being completed either by telephone or virtual.
